

Reflections from Father Jeff

Greetings,

Looking around St. Barnabas on an average Sunday, its sure seems like St. Barnabas is growing and changing. Wanting to put some numbers to my hunch, I asked JD to do a breakdown of the congregation by age.



A note about the breakdown: We have over 600 people on our role but only 435 have listed their birth year. New arrivals who have not yet shared their information are also missing.

No matter how you slice it, this chart paints a picture of the generational breadth of our community and tells me that St. Barnabas has become a true multi-generational church.

And looking at our church attendance figures, unlike many churches, St. Barnabas has rebounded robustly from the Covid years with higher attendance now than before the pandemic. Amid reports of decline in the larger churches, we are indeed blessed to find ourselves in a place of strength.

But in the end, these are but numbers. What matters most is how we navigate this growth and change.

With this in mind, the Vestry and I are discussing ways to get people of all ages together. This year we've scheduled four all-church Sunday feasts. And plans are underway for inter-generational activities this summer and at Christmas.

St. Barnabas did not become the welcoming place it is in a vacuum. We who participate in the current incarnation of St. Barnabas must never forget that we are standing on the shoulders of giants.


In gratitude and hope, may we then be willing to plant trees that we will not see grow into their fulness.

Imagining Freedom

Candlelight flickered on ten round tables as over 35 people huddled in small groups discussing this question:

"What would this town be like if everyone, everywhere, kept the word spoken in the law to 'not steal'? What would the impact be economically, psychologically, and socially, if we honored this law, and then all of the other commandments as well?"

Locks and keys? Passwords and PIN codes? Security cameras and surveillance equipment? Prisons and law enforcement? To what extent would we need these things? Wouldn't our relationships become stronger if we knew we could trust one another? Wouldn't our stress and anxiety decrease significantly? How would our schools change? Our families? Our businesses? The impact of this one principle is so far-reaching it is difficult to imagine.



The Invitation

This was one of many conversations that featured in our time with visiting speaker Marsh Moyle on April 16th and 17th. Guests also viewed and responded to a short film about a sculpture entitled, "The Invitation," created by Romanian artist Liviu Mocan. This sculpture prompted a deep response to the idea of the Decalogue (literally, the "ten words") quite different from our usual reaction to the Ten Commandments found in Exodus 20. Marsh helped us to meditate on how the Psalmist describes the law as "sweeter than honey," "more precious than gold," "rejoicing the heart."

As Marsh writes in his book, "Rumours of a Better Country," the Decalogue, given to Moses on a mountain in the desert, was a guide to keep the people from future slavery. The preamble to the Decalogue is a declaration of freedom: 'I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.' In other words, 'I want you to be free!' Perhaps freedom is one of the principles by which we may know if we have interpreted the Decalogue well; if we are not [more free] after our reflection on it, then we have probably misunderstood it" (Rumours, p. 42).

Speaking for myself, I left the lecture series experiencing a sense of hope and freedom that comes from a glimpse of truth, discovered in the light of community. I look forward to more speakers in the future.




WHAT IS EfM?

Education for Ministry is a four-year study, similar to a seminary course, for adults who want to engage deeply in scripture, Church history, and theology. The St. Barnabas EfM group meets weekly on Tuesday evenings from 6 to 9 pm, beginning August 27 through the end of May, with holidays at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter.

Is EfM FOR ME?

EfM is for open-minded people who welcome new insights into their faith. If you enjoy learning and engaging with other well-informed individuals in a supportive and non-judgmental setting, you will enjoy EfM. The program provides opportunities for intellectual and spiritual growth that many participants find transforming.



EfM integrates critical biblical scholarship, Church history, and theology, while providing skills in reflecting theologically and insights into each person's Christian ministry. The four-year study uses published texts by top scholars as well as the Bible in its curriculum. Year One focuses on the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament); Year Two, on the New Testament; Year Three, on Christian Church history; Year Four, on theology, ethics, and interfaith encounters. Representatives of each year meet together and discuss their studies from the previous week. Meetings begin and end with prayer and may include videos and practicing the skill of theological reflection. One or two mentors guide the meetings.

TAKE THE NEXT STEP.

Enrollment for the 2024-2025 class is for Year One students. Participants will commit for one year at a time. Each prospective participant will meet with the mentor, to ensure that there is an appropriate fit between the person's expectations and the Education for Ministry program. Bishop Suffragan Election

On October 24, clergy and lay delegates in the Diocese of West Texas will gather in Corpus Christi to elect a Bishop Suffragan. The Bishop Suffragan

is an assistant to the Bishop - an essential figure in a diocese as large as West Texas. Bishop Read described the ideal candidate as a person of deep faith and prayer, an excellent leader, a good pastor, and a good shepherd. He/she will serve as co-pilot to Bishop Read and will need an abundance of energy.

The Bishop Nominating Committee, under the leadership of the Rev. Carrie Guerra, consists of ten members, five clergy and five lay. They will soon publish a Diocesan Profile to be used by those who may be discerning if God is calling them. They have asked all of us to join them in prayer for guidance in perceiving God's will for this important decision.

OTHER VOICES





Day Family Scholarship


